DRIVER OF AUTO SUFFERS STROKE

Two of Passengers of Machine Jump Out and Paralysis Victim Later Falls From Car

MRS. WILKES IS VERY ILL.

(Special to The Herald) MAYSVILLE, Ky., April 15.—Mrs. Sallie M. Wilkes, mother of Col. Gilbert Wilkes, U. S. A., Louisville, Ky., while driving to the home of Mrs. Lucien Matthy in Washington, Ky., this afternoon to attend a meeting of Limestone chapter, D. A. R., suffered a paralytic stroke and is in a critical condition at her home here.

The stroke affected her right side. Mrs. Wilkes, accompanied by Mrs. Fred Powers, of Aberdeen, Ohio, and Mrs. W. A. Elyer of Georgetown, Ohio, was driving down a hill on the Lexington road near the Kenton Station pike intersection when she was stricken. Mrs. Powers and Mrs. Elyer jumped from the machine as it rolled down the hill out of control. The car did not leave the road; coming to a stop at the bottom of

Coins, Cigarettes, Comb, Mirror Placed in Double Grave of Gypsy Brothers

(Special to The Herald) RICHMOND, Ky., April 15.—A gypsy tribe buried two of its members today as 2,000 persons, nomads and curious Kentuckians, looked on at Richmond cemetery.

Tom Mitchell, 25, a leader in the caravan comprising 41 members of the Mitchell tribe traveling south in six automobiles, and his brother, Leo, 22, were fatally injured when their car and a truck collided on the Lexington pike Thursday night. Today tribemen requested Father O. L. Poole, of St. Mark's Catholic church here, to officiate at the first part of the burial rites. Father Poole blessed the graves and departed, leaving the Gypsies to complete their own burial ritual.

The father of the two young men, Dick Mitchell, noted that the graves had been opened. Into each he dropped silver coins. Spectators saw that cigarettes, comb, mirror and soap had been placed in each coffin previously. Members of the tribe

pooured wine upon the ground as the double graves were filled. Lester Smith, 21, of Clay county, driver of the truck which killed the Gypsy brothers, was at liberty today under bond of \$5,000 on a charge of manslaughter.

The death of the Gypsy chieftain and his brother has caused more interest in Richmond and Madison county than any event in recent months. At the examining trial of Smith Saturday afternoon, the lower courtroom was packed to capacity, every available inch of space being taken, and at the Turpin and Lackey funeral home more than a thousand persons viewed the bodies Sunday.

Other hundreds visited the Gypsy camp on the Four-Mile pike, where the nomads are being quarantined. Additional articles have swelled the tribe to an estimated 125 persons. Members of the clan from as far away as Pittsburgh and New York came here for the funeral.

JESSE MENG SLAIN BY MILLERSBURG MARSHAL

Officer Says He Fired at Man in Self-Defense; Faces Technical Charge

(Special to The Herald) PARIS, Ky., April 15.—Jesse Meng, negro, was shot and killed late Sunday night in front of the Exchange bank at Millersburg by Luther Herrington, marshal of Millersburg.

Herrington said he fired in self-defense when Meng resisted arrest. Meng was said to be carrying a shotgun and had threatened the lives of other persons when hearing was called to arrest him. Witnesses said both hammers of Meng's gun were cocked, after he was shot down. Herrington was brought to the county jail in Paris on a technical charge, pending an investigation.

In Bourbon county court today, Richard Puckett, charged with petit larceny, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 30 days in jail by County Judge George Batten.

WILHOITE ELECTED

Will Be Member of Woodford Budget Commission

(Special to The Herald) VERSAILLES, Ky., April 15.—At a meeting of the Woodford fiscal court, Hiram Wilhoite, vice president of the Woodford Bank and Trust Company, was elected as the third member of the Woodford county budget commission to act with County Judge James R. Bond, and County Attorney Louis M. Morancy in formulating a county budget for the new fiscal year.

The court will fix the county's ad valorem tax rate at its May meeting after receiving the report of the budget commission. The rate will cover the 18 months period from January 1, 1935 to June 30, 1936.

William E. Cox, receiver and superintendent of the Woodford county infirmary and farm, reported to the court that there are now only 22 persons at the infirmary.

PILOT "BALS OUT"

Resorts to Parachute as Plane Falls at Ashland

ASHLAND, Ky., April 15 (AP)—An army observation plane crashed at the edge of Ashland today after the Pilot, Sergeant William McDonald, was forced to bail out apparently by engine failure.

Sergeant McDonald, who jumped with his parachute at a low elevation, escaped with slight injuries. He was returning to Maxwell field, Montgomery, Ala., after a one-day country training trip to Huntington, W. Va.

The craft fell on Beech street near the city limits. It rolled off the street, hit a tree and caught fire.

State Treasurer Opens Campaign for Governor in Speech Delivered in Rockcastle County

WILL SUPPORT SALES TAX

(Special to The Herald) MT. VERNON, Ky., April 15.—State Treasurer Elam Huddleston, of Louisville, candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, opened his campaign in normally Republican Rockcastle county today with a campaign address at the courthouse.

As outlined in his address, Huddleston's platform includes: Re-enactment of the state sales tax, with an amendment to exempt necessities such as bread and meat, and relieving general property from all taxes.

More stringent economy in state government. Re-enactment of the liquor control act, with administration assigned to a liquor control board rather than to the state tax commission.

A constitutional amendment to permit the re-election of state and municipal officers.

An old age pension law, "similar to the plan advocated by President Roosevelt."

More liberal appropriations for rural teachers; uniform certificate and payment provisions provided by law, and a teachers' annuity or pension.

More equitable distribution of representatives in the state legislature. Appointment of a highway commission favorable to the construction of four-lane highways.

TRACTS OF LAND SOLD IN JESSAMINE COUNTY

154 Acres, Owned by Robert McGoon, Are Bought by Bank

(Special to The Herald) NICHOLASVILLE, Ky., April 15.—L. Saunders, master commissioner of the Jessamine circuit court, sold at public auction a small tract of land, which included the storehouse of the late Reuben Webb, at Nealon, in the action of George H. Mays against Reuben Webb's administratrix, to William P. Knight and Henry H. Knight for \$1,485. The tract adjoins the F. D. Knight stock farm.

In the case of the Joint Stock Land Bank of Lexington against Robert McGoon, a tract of 154 acres in the western part of the county, adjoining the lands of A. H. Jewell, was purchased by the Joint Stock Land Bank for \$12,000.

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
