FRESH BEEF TO BE DISTRIBUTED

Half Million Pounds Will Be Bought by Government Each Month for Consumption by Kentucky's Needy

ANNOUNCE PURCHASE PLAN

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 19 (AP)—Half a million pounds of fresh beef monthly will be purchased and distributed in Kentucky by the federal emergency relief administration at Washington, Capt. Albert M. Woody, commodity officer for the Kentucky relief commission, revealed today.

The plan, Woody said, has the double purpose of absorbing the farm surplus and providing food for

destitute and unemployed. The plan for Kentucky is part of a national service.

Woody will confer with Louisville business men in an effort to work out a method of purchasing Kentucky cattle on the hoof, slaughtering and processing here and in other Kentucky cities, and distributing the product by truck and train.

Shipments to all cities and towns within easy reach of Louisville and other distributing centers, Woody said, must be fresh beef, but service to remote localities, where spoilage would be a factor, requires the meat to be canned and sent out as roast beef and corned beef. Woody said he expected to complete plans within several days and submit them to Washington for approval.

Woody also was informed of allocation to Kentucky's needy of 3,320,429 pounds of flour, 432,160 pounds of cheese and 100,000 pounds of dried beans to be sent from Washington on shipment orders from relief headquarters here.

CHAPMAN SPEAKS

Addresses Jessamine Farmers on AAA Leaf Program

NICHOLASVILLE, Ky., Dec. 19—Congressman Virgil M. Chapman told Jessamine county growers at a meeting at the courthouse here today that the quickest way to recover the burley market would be to effect a sign-up of the burley control agreements.

Congressman Chapman discussed the efforts behind the move to place the contracts before the burley growers, and declared they were the best of the several contracts sent out from Washington to control the production of basic commodities.

Wednesday morning Congressman Chapman will address a mass meeting of growers at Frankfort, and in the afternoon will go to Stanford, where he will speak to growers there.

Helen Is Favorite

Tennis Champ Voted Outstanding Women Sports Performer in 1933

NEW YORK, Dec. 19 (AP)—Helen Hull Jacobs, United States tennis champion and outstanding player in the Wightman Cup series with Great Britain, today took her place alongside Carl Owen Hubbell, New York Giants' great southpaw, as an outstanding performer in sports for 1933.

Over a third of 179 sports experts balloting in the third annual Associated Press sports poll named the former crown princess of tennis as the queen of sports for 1933 as they had named Hubbell the outstanding performer among the men.

Helen received 64 votes to gain a decisive edge over her nearest rival, Virginia Van Wie, two times winner of the national golf title.

Only four sports were represented. Golf topped the list with five representatives, tennis had four, swimming two, field hockey one, and all-around performance one.

TRADE DIRECTORS WILL DISCUSS LEAF PROBLEM

Chairman W. H. Courtney Will Report on Tobacco Situation at Luncheon-Meeting

The tobacco situation in Lexington and Kentucky will be the principal matter discussed at a luncheon meeting of the directors of the Lexington Board of Commerce at 12:15 o'clock today in the rose room at the Phoenix hotel.

A report on the situation will be made by W. H. Courtney, chairman of the tobacco committee of the board, and will be followed by a round table discussion.

At a meeting of the board yesterday steps were taken to interest state officials in a plan to build an armory in Lexington of sufficient size for horse shows, indoor polo games, cavalry drills, agricultural shows and certain types of conventions. This move was prompted by announcement at Frankfort that the state planned to erect armories in a number of Kentucky cities for the use of Kentucky national guard organizations. There is a national guard cavalry troop in Lexington.

Thomas H. Underwood was appointed by Fred B. Wachs, president of the board, to act as chairman of a committee to discuss the plan with state officials. Mr. Underwood was authorized to select other members of the committee.
